- Name
- Approximate length of service to KTA's mission
- Brief description of contribution

The **KTA Citation Award for Lifetime Achievement** is presented to a person who has, over a period of years (not necessarily their entire lifetime), made significant contributions to the preservation of hiking trails and promoting hiking in Pennsylvania. Service may be in the form of volunteer efforts, publications, fieldwork, or any other pursuit that has furthered the mission of the KTA.

The **Thyra Sperry Volunteer of the Year Award** goes to a KTA member whose recent service to KTA's mission, especially in the preceding year, is most worthy of recognition. It is named in honor of former KTA president Thyra Sperry (d. 2017) and her devoted service to KTA.

Certificates of Achievement can also be awarded based on nominations from KTA member organizations for extraordinary work on projects that benefit hikers and/or trails in Pennsylvania. This award option allows clubs to nominate a volunteer who may not be an individual KTA member. The nomination should be based on recent service, especially in the past year, that serves the hiking public as a whole rather than primarily the members of the member club.

KTA members willing to serve on the Board may be nominated by petition

submitted to the Nominations Committee. Nominations may be made by a minimum of ten members of the Association and accompanied by written consent of the nominee. Petitions should be delivered to either the Nominating Committee or the Secretary no later than 30 days prior to the Annual Meeting.

Another Reroute Completed on KTA's Section of the AT

The Appalachian Trail has been rerouted back onto the trail corridor just east of the Lehigh River between Palmerton and Walnutport, PA as of June, 2022. The 3.25 mile section was rebuilt by the Pennsylvania Outdoor Corps and a crew led by professional designer and trail builder Peter Jensen. The work was supervised by Bob Sickley, Regional Manager of the Trail from the Susquehanna River to the Hudson River.



The accompanying slideshow shows the spectacular views of the Palmerton and Walnutport areas that are now visible from the A.T., as well as the excellent rock work done by the trail builders.

This reroute completes a process of remediation begun several years ago. This section of the A.T. goes through a federal Superfund site that was damaged by a zinc processing plant in Palmerton. The Trail was temporarily rerouted so that a team led by the federal Environmental Protection Agency could remediate the damaged soil and plant new trees and vegetation. Last October, KTA and other partners including ATC rerouted another section of the A.T., just west of the Lehigh River. The A.T. was rerouted onto the former North Trail, providing spectacular views of the Lehigh Gorge and surrounding area. More on that reroute [can be found here](#).

KTA is grateful for the outstanding work performed by our volunteers and partners in making these relocations possible.

Exploring Gibraltar Hill

Big thanks to the [Blue Mountain Eagle Climbing Club](#) for hosting a KTA Evening Ramble on July 14th. Participants enjoyed a 3.3 mile loop at the

William Penn State Forest's [Gibraltar Hill Tract](#), led by Brook Lenker and David Bailey, BMECC President. The forested landscape of Gibraltar Hill offers glimpsing views of the surrounding hills and valleys. While the trail system is still in development, the site is bound to become an important hiking venue. Coincidentally, it's also near a great ice cream shop, providing a sweet finale to a summer hike.



The Susquehanna Rocks

Hikers like paddling, too. On July 24th, a group of KTA adventurers navigated the Susquehanna River from Fort Hunter to Wormleysburg, enriched by eagles, egrets, islands, and, more than a few, rock ledges throughout the voyage. The iconic water gaps and blue herons framed a stop at island 74a, a campsite on the Susquehanna River Water Trail - Middle Section. Participants each received a copy of the map and guide to the water trail which is promoted and maintained by the [Susquehanna River Trail Association](#), who works cooperatively with PA Bureau of Forestry, manager of the commonwealth islands in this section of the river. Thanks to [Susquehanna Outfitters](#) for providing kayaks and shuttle services for this delightful outing.



Trail Gap Data Needed by DCNR

DCNR is partnering with the Pennsylvania Environmental Council (PEC) and will utilize the online [Trail Implementation and Management \(TIM\)](#) tool for the collection of all trail gap data.

To submit data for your trail gaps, we are asking trail managers to:

1. [Visit the TIM tool](#).
2. Follow the instructions then complete the "intake form" for each of your trail gaps along the section(s) of trail your organization manages.
3. Once the basic information is provided through the intake form, the information will be processed within 7 to 10 days and trail managers will be emailed with instructions on how to access the TIM.

4. Complete Trail Gap Profile within the TIM.

Generally, we are seeking gap data for trails (non-motorized or motorized) that meet the following criteria:

- Trails that are a majority off-road or are planned to have a majority off-road alignment
- Trails that are planned to be at least 5 miles long
- Trails that connect multiple municipalities and/or counties
- Trails that are formally recognized in an official planning document

Currently, the data collection effort is expected to continue through September 30, 2022. If you have questions about the process, please contact Chris Corbran, PEC Program Coordinator at TIMTool@pecpa.org.

ATC Accepting Grant Proposals

The ATC is now accepting applications for the 2022 RPC Mini-grants program from the New England and Mid-Atlantic regions. The guidelines and application form were distributed by regional staff to club leaders in June. The deadline for applications is September 10, 2022 and awards will be determined by the Regional Partnership Committees no later than the fall meeting.

Volunteers are needed to help execute this vital and

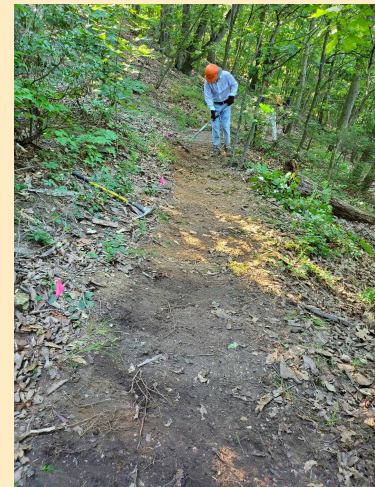
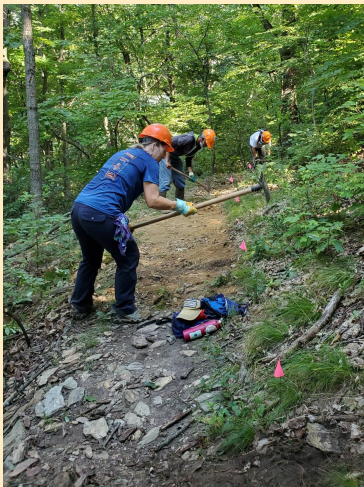

Are you ready to take your trail maintenance skills to the next level?

KTA and the North Country Trail Association are pleased to announce the *Building with Rock* trail maintenance training workshop at McConnells Mill State Park in Portersville, PA, **August 26-28**.

Come learn about the tools, techniques and teamwork required to build trail structures out of rock. Building with rock can be a physically strenuous task, and a focus of the training will be on proper body mechanics. Tools, personal protective equipment, meals, and campsites will be provided. Participation is limited to nine people. Participants must bring their own camping gear, boots or sturdy closed-toe shoes, long pants, water bottle, and, if available, shatterproof safety goggles and work gloves. The session begins Friday evening at 7:00 p.m. and concludes Sunday afternoon by 4:00 p.m.

Trail Care Report July 14-17 Allegheny Front Trail

The 2022 Trail Care season is flying by, with 7 events in the books and just 4 more chances to volunteer with KTA this year. The most recent event on the Allegheny Front Trail is proof positive that many hands make light work. We had reasonable weather for

mid-July; it was not too sweltering.

Thanks to scouting reports from AFT guidebook author Ben Cramer, Moshannon forester Zac Miller, AFT trail race director Norb Baier, and local hiker Susan Kerlin, we had a good handle on possible projects. On Friday, most of us headed to the most overgrown section, armed with gas-powered brushcutters and loppers. 2 full days of work made this section much more easily traveled. There are still rhododendron tunnels, but now they're wider. Another volunteer set to clearing the access trail we used, while others chainsawed and DR mowed.



All told, the following was accomplished over the weekend:

1. From Moosehead Lane northwest to Shingle Mill Trail (2.3 miles): brushed and lopped
2. From Tram Road west to Meyers Run Road (~5.5 miles): cleared of blowdowns
3. mays Run Trail east to Underwood Road (1.7 miles): mowed
4. PA-504 north to Casanova Road (3 miles): cleared of blowdowns
5. Moosehead Lane access trail (.2 miles) brushed and lopped. Parking areas cleared at Benner Run and Meyers Run Roads.
6. Slide Hollow (~1 mile) and Halls Run to Tram Road (1.25 mile): lopped.

What to Expect:

August 18-21 Trail Care: Thunder Swamp Trail System

The Thunder Swamp Trail System comprises 26 miles of hiking trails in Delaware State Forest in the southern end of Pike County. Up until the pandemic hiatus, KTA Trail Care volunteers had been helping to maintain the trail with a yearly event based out of the nearby Resica Falls Boy Scout Camp. This year we return to the Pocono plateau with a mission to pick up where we left off clearing the trail with loppers, brush cutting overgrowth and removing a backlog of blowdowns. There will be no shortage of work



available to willing hands of all abilities. We will again be based out of the Bear Paw site at Resica Falls BSA camp. This camp is conveniently located just a few miles south of the Thunder Swamp's southern gateway off Route 402. To get to the camp from Route 80, take the 209 North exit to the traffic circle where you will swing left following signs to Marshalls Creek and 402. Once in Marshalls Creek you will make a right and a second quick right to get on 402 heading north. Just over the bridge that crosses the Bush Kill, turn right into the camp entrance announced by prominent signage. Follow the road, slowly, straight back past the dining hall and the frog

with a tophat to the designated camp site. Volunteers will need to bring all their own personal camping gear and food needs. Two pavilions and showers will be available. As always, working to improve the hiking experience on this trail will be a personally rewarding experience and a benefit to the entire hiking community.

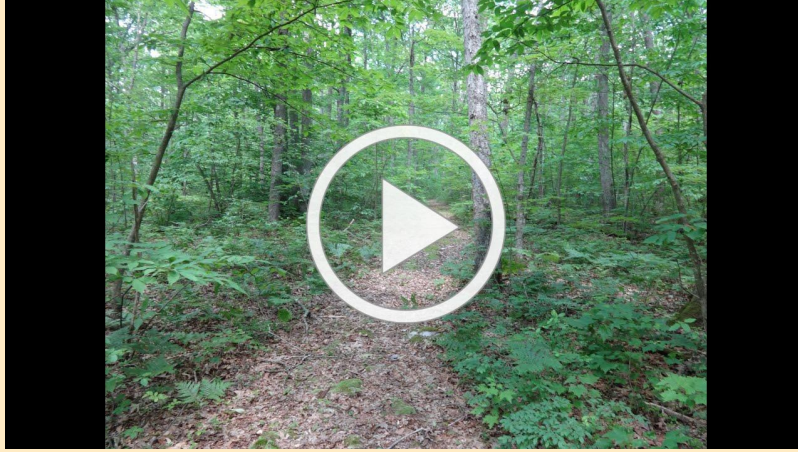

DCNR Releases Draft E-Bike Policy

DCNR has unveiled its draft policy regarding the use of e-bikes on DCNR managed lands. According to the agency, the policy, when adopted, will allow e-bikes to be used on DCNR-managed trails where traditional bikes are allowed. E-bikes will not be allowed on Natural Areas; designated hiking trails (blazed with yellow or orange); or on trails or roads specifically marked closed for biking. The policy is intended to advance recommendations elevated in the [Pennsylvania Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan](#) entitled Recreation for All and the Bureau of State Parks' [Penn's Parks for All – A Plan for Pennsylvania's State Parks of Tomorrow](#)).

The draft policy states that e-bikes will be treated equally to human-powered bikes by department staff, provided they:

- weigh no more than 100 pounds;
- do not exceed 20 mph using the motor functionality;
- are equipped with a motor no more than 750 watts; and,
- are equipped with fully functional, operable pedals.

The policy further qualifies e-bike use:

- On trails designated for non-motorized use, operators shall only use human power or pedal-assist power (motor assistance while pedaling) to operate e-bikes.
- Using the electric motor exclusively to move an e-bike for an extended period of time without pedaling is prohibited on nonmotorized trails.
- Operators shall adhere to advised speed limits along trails and not exceed 20 miles per hour while using the electric motor.

DCNR invites written comments on the draft policy until August 31. Comments can be submitted to RA-NR_PolicyOffice@pa.gov. Please consider sharing your opinions with the agency.

KTA will be developing and submitting formal comments on behalf of the organization.

Appalachian Landscapes Protection Fund to Conserve Key PA Forests

Benefitting Pennsylvania hikers and hiking trails, the [Open Space Institute](#) announced on July 27th "a major new effort of its [Appalachian Landscapes Protection Fund](#) (ALPF) to conserve key forested areas in western and central Pennsylvania" A generous grant from the Richard King Mellon Foundation will accelerate the Fund's efforts to protect land in these areas for carbon capture and wildlife habitat. The targeted area stretches from the Pennsylvania Wilds in the northern tier southward through the Allegheny Front, and from the Laurel Highlands to the Maryland border.

DCNR Secretary Receives Lifetime Achievement Award

DCNR Secretary Cindy Adams Dunn recently received Pennsylvania

Environmental Council's (PEC) Lifetime Achievement Award for her outstanding contributions over the course of a career in the environmental, conservation, or outdoor recreation fields.

Throughout the years, Secretary Dunn has demonstrated a commitment to trail development in the state. Amongst many noteworthy accomplishments, she presided over the development of Pennsylvania's nationally-recognized Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan, with the goal of ensuring equitable access to the outdoors for all Pennsylvanians.

A biologist by training, Dunn came to state government by way of the nonprofit sector, where she ran the Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay's Pennsylvania program for ten years.

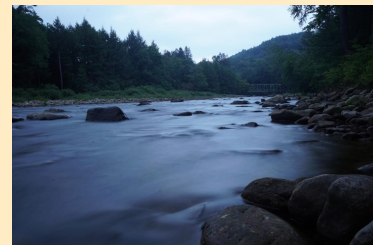
She has also served as Executive Director of Audubon Pennsylvania, and most recently as President and CEO of PennFuture. She served on the PEC Board of Directors from 1999 to 2001.
