Grant for KTA Clubs

KTA Member Clubs can now apply for grants to assist projects beneficial to trails, the vitality of clubs, and the practice of hiking. The spring 2022 round will award **up to seven \$500 grants** to qualifying clubs.

Sample project expenditures might include tools for trail maintenance, materials for trail improvements (e.g., lumber for bridge), trail signage, van rental (e.g., van to shuttle volunteers), facility rental costs (e.g., for club events, exhibit space, etc.), food (e.g., for volunteers or club events), promotional costs (stickers, advertising, t-shirts, etc.), or event or liability insurance costs.

Volunteer's Corner

Trail Maintenance Training: A Weekend of Dynamic Hands-On Learning

Renewing our tradition of providing training on relevant trail and outdoor topics, KTA has an opportunity for you, **March 25-27**, **2022**, in South Central Pennsylvania. Register for our Trail Care 101 Leadership Workshop near Arendtsville and proximate to the Michaux State Forest. Our lead trainer is Tom Moutsos, a Regional Trail Manager with the North Country Trail Association. Tom will be assisted by Jenn Ulmer, an experienced KTA trail care leader.

Learn or hone a variety of trail maintenance and design skills plus best practices for organizing safe, fun, and effective workdays. Major topics to be covered include protective gear & safety equipment, risk management, trail survey and design, ADA standards, hands-on practice using clinometers and flag lines, a 'trail eyes' hike to see trail design-caused problems, common trail maintenance practices, a group trail project, and tool maintenance & tips on transporting tools and people.

Lodging (double-occupancy rooms) and meals are provided from our base at Camp Nawakwa. The workshop convenes Friday evening and adjourns Sunday afternoon. Participants representing member clubs are offered a discounted price, but anyone with a passion for trail work is encouraged to attend. Space is limited. Click on the link above to sign-up.

Trail Care Confidential

The goal of KTA's Trail Care Program is to keep Pennsylvania's hiking trail systems safe, open and accessible to everyone who wishes to experience the outdoors by footpath. Volunteers who attend Trail Care events usually concentrate on two aspects of the physical setting, the treadway and the trail corridor.

The treadway is the actual ground (or rocks) that your feet come in contact with while hiking. It is usually between 1 to 2 feet wide. On hills and slopes, depending on the grade, we may have to dig or bench the treadway into the soil (or rocks) in order to make a more secure footing surface. This usually entails using one or more of a variety of digging tools such as a hazel hoe, pulaski, pickmatic or fire rake. When digging the bench, or rebenching a trail where the ground has collapsed on the treadway, which often occurs over time, maintainers seek to outslope the bench, or slightly angle the treadway outward, so that water is able to run off the bench and does not pool or run down the trail causing rutting and erosion. Blowdowns and dead falls that impinge upon the treadway are cut up and removed by using either hand saws or a chain saw, depending on their girth.

The trail corridor is the area around the trail that the treadway passes through. We usually try to clear encroaching vegetation back so that the trail corridor is open about three feet on each side of the treadway. The KTA Trail Care Program refers to this as being a "five year cut", meaning that if no one were to return to this section of trail for five year the treadway would still be discernable and not totally overgrown. Also, with the proliferation of ticks in Pennsylvania, having the trail corridor wide enough so that hikers are not brushing against vegetation as they pass through reduces the possibility of picking up the unwanted and troublesome pest, so this width is a safety consideration as well.

Many of the trails that volunteers with the KTA Trail Care Program work on do not have a club or individual maintainers who regularly look after them (we refer to these as 'orphan trails') so it is indeed possible that it will be 5 years or longer before another trail care weekend is scheduled. Opening the trail corridor usually is accomplished by running power brushcutters outfitted with either a tri-blade or sickle bar and employing long handled loppers. Reblazing the trail corridor is another important job that volunteers accomplish at scheduled events. It is important to remember that when you experience trail magic while hiking, it is often the volunteer maintainers who have cast the spell.

The Briar Patch

Scourge of the Month: The Devil's Walking Stick (Aralia Spinosa)

The aptly named Devil's Walking Stick, also known as Hercules-club, is a woody stemmed deciduous tree that has viciously sharp thorns on its slender trunk, spiny leaf stems and even prickles on its leaf midribs. It is a nasty package that you don't want to



accidentally encounter after dark. In Pennsylvania it grows most prevalently in the southwestern quadrant. I first encountered it doing trail work on the Everett Region of the Mid State Trail. The Devil's Walking Stick usually has a branchless trunk and can grow to a height of over 20 feet. It is often found in clusters because it can spread by way of shoots and rhizomes. Remarkably, although it is only a medium sized tree, due to its triply compound leaf structure it

is considered to have the largest leaves of any temperate tree in the continental United States. It is a member of the Briar Patch family to be both wary of and respected.

Hiker's Corner

Get to Know Your State Forest - Loyalsock SF



<u>Jeff's Jaunts</u> <u>Hike the Gooseneck - Bald Eagle Forest</u>



The Gooseneck is unlike any other place in Pennsylvania, a rugged gorge surrounded by vast fields of talus slopes. These talus, or rock, slopes, offer non-stop views. Gorges like this are rare in the ridge and valley region of the state. Buffalo Creek flows through the gorge and can be heard on the hike. This hike is very rugged, and most of it is off trail. Care is required to traverse the talus slopes. Do not attempt if the rocks are wet.

We began at the Frederick Trail along Old Shingle Road where there is space to park. This trail is

blazed. It is best to follow it down to Buffalo Creek. At the creek, head off trail and hike down the creek, which is scenic. Reach the first large talus slope and climb. This is Weathertop and it has excellent views from the summit, including one looking down the gorge. This is a beautiful spot, so spend some time here.

A very rugged descent follows to the talus slopes below, which offer more views of the gorge. Some of the rock blocks are large, and some shift, so take care. The hiking is intense, but well worth it. We crossed the talus slopes and then dropped down to the creek, which we also crossed.

Next were the talus slopes on the south side of the creek, which offered even nicer views. We climbed to the Two Towers, where there was an excellent view looking down into the lowlands. The towers are massive rock cairns. We retraced our steps down and crossed the creek again, climbing the slopes to the north.

More views greeted us. We found an old grade which crossed the talus slopes, the workmanship to build something like this was impressive. We hiked the grade down a little to more fine views. However, we soon turned around and climbed the final series of talus slopes, to more, you guessed it, views.



We then entered the woods, fearing a

gruesome bushwhack through laurel. To our surprise, we came upon a hunter's trail that was fairly easy to follow, although it was faint in spots. This trail took us back to the road, which we followed to the cars.


This is an incredibly challenging and rewarding route for experienced hikers. The terrain is very different and unique, and the views are beautiful. This loop is 4-5 miles long. Parking is at about 40.949931, -77.198476.


